information, please let Nancy Moore-Carr know, and she will forward your name to our regional representative, Sharon MacDonald. Sharon will be




happy to answer any questions you might have regarding the work done by the Pastoral Relations Commission.


#### **CONGRATULATIONS AND PRAYERS**

Work repairs continue to be done on the wheelchair accessible ramp by members of the Stewards Committee


