He is one of the most quiet, competent and unassuming volunteers that we have ever had.


He is open to any suggestions, and we rely on him for accurate and thoughtful reflection at all times.


A NEW YEAR'S CHANGE FOR SHEILA'S PANTRY AND OUR TRINITY FOOD BANK CONTRIBUTIONS
