Camp Quin-Mo-Lac Fundraiser

There will be a camp Quin-Mo-Lac fundraiser coming your way. As noted in the minutes of the April 5th Committee of Stewards meeting we set a goal of raising \$1,000 during the month of May to support our local United



Church camp Quin-Mo-Lac. Some of us have been campers there. Some have been counsellors; some staff. Some have attended UCW weekends. Millie Cuthill and Linda Brown were both campers in the 1950's. Darlene Nicol and Glenda Turner have had some wonderful UCW weekends there. Ian and Jane Mackay's 3 sons were all involved there. Currently, we invite you to read the testimonials today of our younger generation who have also had Quin-Mo-Lac experience...

Amber: "I have been going to Quin Mo LAC for 5 years before Covid hit. I always looked forward to going each year with my friends. Some of my favourite things to do there are definitely the rock wall and playing all the different games camp provided. This year at camp I am hoping to become a CIT (Counsellor in Training).) at Quin Mo Lac so I can help others have the same amount of fun I had at camp."

Jocelyn: "I have been going to Quin Mo Lac since grade 3. One thing I remember is that the Men In Black fun day, usually when at camp they have a theme day I have been to 2. One was a time travel day and one the Men in Black day. I love swimming and the polar plunge which is where you wake up early and go to the lake. I love Quin Mo Lac."

Carmen didn't write anything specific however she is super excited to go this year. She was registered to go her first year in 2020 and was beyond disappointed that she didn't get to go since her sisters both started when they were in grade 3. She has already decided she will be climbing to the top of the climbing wall.

Our Trinity Quin-Mo-Lac Fund supports parents of our own congregation who would welcome some financial assistance to make camp possible for their children this summer. Two children from our congregation will attend Camp Quin Mo Lac on a "full scholarship". In addition, Trinity worked closely with Prince Charles Public School in Verona to identify children there who would benefit from a camping experience and to offer financial support where needed. Arrangements have been made for two grade 5 students from the school to attend camp alongside our congregational children.

In the broader picture, this 72 year old camp itself is working hard to meet all Covid protocols, and to update some much needed changes. Focus now is on completing the new roof over the Dining Hall Deck; bringing in water bottle filling stations to replace drinking fountains; installing touchless hand washing faucets and soap dispensers, and buying more picnic tables to accommodate outdoor dining and a cover for the swimming pool. Already 130 new vinyl covered mattresses have been bought to replace the cloth-covered ones.

How do we pay for all this? We care for our children, both our own and those in the larger Pastoral Charge community. Therefore we give what we can. Here's a suggestion brought by one of our congregants that you might consider... For those of us who have received a cheque from the Ontario Government in the mail (license plate sticker refund), perhaps you would consider donating a portion of your refund to Camp Quin-Mo-Lac. Or maybe, if you have the luxury of owning or

Church Finances

Local Expenses - Our income for this period was \$23,098.07. Our expenses for the same period was \$42,308.09 leaving us with a shortfall of \$19,210.02. Because of the winter weather was colder this year than in previous years with more snowfall, our expenses for heating and snow removal have increased significantly over previous years.

<u>Mission & Service</u> - Our givings to Mission and Service for the same period was \$2,645.50. Our projected target for 2022 is \$12,000.

With the winter and its associated expenses behind us and with our regular renters starting to return, we can look forward to an improvement to our financial situation.

Bible Study for

Acts 2:1-21 and Proverbs 8:1-4, 17

Both of these Scripture passages are first among those that provoke a sense of 'where' and 'why' for both Pentecost and for Trinity Sunday. Acts 2 is the story of how the Holy Spirit came on the day of Pentecost and Proverbs speaks of Wisdom's part in creation.

Wind is a very common image of the Spirit. When that Spirit wind blew through those first disciples, they had no idea where it was going to take them,



but they didn't fight it; they let the Spirit lead. Can you imagine that happening in our church now? Would we trustingly follow? I doubt it very much.

The disciples were assembled for the day of Pentecost, the 50th after the Sabbath of Passover week. Pentecost is also called the *Festival of Weeks [Deut. 16:10], Festival of Harvest [Ex.23:16]* & the day of *Firstfruits [Num. 28:26]* In Judaism, Pentecost was traditionally seen as the day Moses received the law. Now it will be seen as the day the Spirit came to fulfill God's promise as given in the Law and the Prophets. *"They"* were all together (11 apostles plus Matthias) *in one place,* most likely the temple precincts as they were *"continually at the temple" [Lk.24: 53]* when it was open.

Breath or wind is a symbol of the Spirit of God and the coming of the Spirit is marked by (audible) wind and (visible) fire signs. These two signs were fulfillment of Jesus' promise and the spirits of all the apostles were completely under the control of the Holy Spirit...their words were his words. This has huge significance where people of different nationalities and languages were gathered in Jerusalem for the festival – and what happened here involved more than the apostles as the phrase *"whole house"* may indeed refer to the temple; as referred to in Acts 7:44-47 and the building of a dwelling place for the *God of Jacob* and the *tabernacle of the covenant law*.

Wisdom was the first of God's creations. Wisdom, aka Sophia, danced with God, drawing a circle on the deep and bringing delight to God's work. As wind and fire came to those assembled within the house (probably the temple), Wisdom *takes her stand where the paths meet beside the gate leading into the city. [Pro. 8:2-3] and she cries aloud.* There is a clear relation between Wisdom (God's first creation) and her *raising her voice to all mankind [Pro. 8:4].* We are instructed further to choose her instruction instead of silver, knowledge rather than gold, as wisdom is more precious than rubies. Her continuing lessons are echoed in those of Jesus, as fearing (respecting, loving) God means hating evil. Proverbs 8:17 is the clearest of all *— "I love those who love me, and those who seek me find me."* Jesus taught that to seek is to find, and here we find Wisdom exhorting us to do the same, many years before Jesus was incarnated on this earth. As Psalm 8 cries *"How glorious is God's name!"*
